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1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Bhartiya Shikshan Sanstha, Nawargaon established in the year 1950, is one of the oldest educational institutions situated in the most remote part of Chandrapur District in eastern Vidarbha. Established in the year 1968, Shri Dnyanesh Mahavidyalaya has invited the attention of innumerable educational fraternity towards its recognition as the qualitative educational institution in this region both in quality and quantity parameters. The Founder of Sanstha, Late Shri Balaji Patil Borkar was a visionary and had an incisive understanding of the social needs that beset his times. He was fully aware of the dire need for education in this area. From the very beginning, Sanstha has laid its emphasis on education for the downtrodden and the poor that really form the major bulk of the society in this remote region.

Today, Sanstha runs one senior institution, two junior institutions, one drawing institution, two high schools, one hostel for backward class high school students, one hostel for institution girls, one primary school, and one kindergarten. The Sanstha has 146 employees and more than 3000 students.

Shri Dnyanesh Mahavidyalaya, one of the leading educational institutes, established on 1st July 1968, is situated in Nawargaon, a place situated in a remote and socio-economically backward region of Chandrapur District.

The institution's campus is spread over an area of 7 acres of lush green land. It has been providing quality higher education in Arts and Science streams at the graduate and postgraduate levels. The institution runs 18 UG, 6 PG programs, and 02 certificate courses

The institution is permanently affiliated to Gondwana University, Gadchiroli, and is approved under section 2(f) and 12(b) of the University Grants Commission (UGC) act. The institution was awarded ISO: 9001-2015 Certified Institution. Institution reaccredited 'B' grade by NAAC with CGPA 2.40 in 2015.

6. Registered and functional Alumni Association with the financial contribution of Rs. 118000.
7. 02 certificate courses and 5 MoUs for student training, placement, research, etc are functional.
8. Excellent ICT facilities for the teaching-learning process.
9. Eco-friendly campus with green practices such as Roof Top Solar Panel, Power Generation System and Rainwater Harvesting Unit.
10. Institution conducted Green Audit, Academic and Administrative Audit, Energy Audit, weather report, and has ISO: 9001-2015 certification.
11. The greater average number of girls students than boys.

Institutional Weakness

1. Maximum students belonging to vernacular languages.
2. Socially and financially deprived background of the students.
3. Restrictions in appointing permanent teaching and administrative staff due to Government policies.
4. Insufficient transportation facility for the students.
5. Conservative culture tends the girl students to marry earlier which results in to increase drop-out ratio.

Institutional Opportunity

1. To obtain corporate funds for institution development.
2. To build competencies among rural students to face day-to-day challenges.
3. With the recent changes in higher education in the globalized world the institution endeavors to further increase its national and international research, internship, faculty, and student exchange linkages.
4. To strive hard for achieving excellent performance in sports, co-curricular, and extra-curricular activities.

Institutional Challenge

1. The maximum students are from the weaker socio-economic and rural background.
2. Lack of Government support for adding newer courses in the institution.
3. Non-availability of qualified candidates for teaching on a clock hour basis.

4. To achieve excellence by involving masses from socially weaker sections.
5. Strengthening and making the student competent for entrepreneurship development.
6. Improvisation in the pedagogical use of ICT enabled teaching-learning.
7. To remove the inferiority complex from the students.
8. To motivate the faculty towards sustainable, purposeful, and co-oriented research by getting research grants and claiming patents.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

1. The institution is permanently affiliated to Gondwana University, Gadchiroli and scrupulously follows the curricula prescribed by the University.
2. The institution is offering 18 UG programs and from the academic session 2019-2020, newly introduced 6 PG programs follow the CBCS curriculum.
3. The institution has been running of 1 UGC Career Oriented Course to meet graduate attributes and learning outcomes in order to fulfill the agricultural needs of the region.
4. The institution has a newly introduced 01 certificate course in Marathi, Importance of Marathi grammar in Competitive Examination.
5. Faculty representation as BoS Chairman, BoS Membership, and in curriculum development committees and other committees of the University.
6. Preparation of academic calendar, departmental meetings, allotment of workload, preparation of timetable, teachers' diary, use of ICT tools, field projects, use of various academic software, feedback mechanisms are some of the tools implemented by the institution for effective curriculum delivery.
7. IQAC conducts seminars/workshops/symposiums, guest lectures, faculty orientation programs, training programs for teaching and non-teaching staff, etc. for curriculum and administrative enrichment and enhancement.
8. Effective integration of cross-cutting issues relevant to Gender, Environment, Human Values, and Professional Ethics into the curriculum. Apart from the university curriculum, the institution organizes various extra-curricular activities such as 'No Petroleum-Vehicle Day', plastic-free campus, gender sensitivity programs, etc. through the NSS unit.
9. The structural online feedback is collected from maximum students on the curriculum. The feedback is then analyzed and discussed in the departmental meetings for improvement and further necessary action.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

1. Institution is situated in the most rural and remote region of the Eastern Vidarbha zone in the state of Maharashtra. The students come from neighboring villages with agricultural backgrounds.
2. The institution identifies advanced and slow learners by Marks obtained in their previous examinations and conducting class tests/ unit tests. The identified slow learners are given extra coaching through Remedial classes. Advanced learners are encouraged to participate in Research Festivals at university, state, and national levels.
3. Necessary facilities are available for differently-abled students (Divyangjan) like ramp and wheelchair.
4. Well-functioning Parent Teacher Association (PTA) and counseling cell.

5. Various student-centric learning methods and tools such as field projects, on-the-job training, ICT enabled classrooms, etc. for enhancing teaching-learning processes.
6. The institution has made the practice of learning outcomes and communicated to the teachers as well as students and uploaded it on the institution website. Learning outcomes are assessed from time to time.
7. The institution encourages teachers to acquire higher qualifications. As an outcome of this, the number of teachers with a Ph.D. during the last five years has significantly increased from 8 to 12 and 4 teachers have registered for Ph. D.
8. The institution follows the academic calendar for conducting the Continuous Internal Evaluation (CIE) by conducting regular class tests, seminars, open-book tests, surprise tests, presentations, home assignments, etc.
9. Learning outcomes are reflected in a satisfactory pass percentage of the students.
10. The institution has a transparent and time-bound mechanism to deal with examination related grievances.

IQAC reviews the academic performance of each department.

Research, Innovations and Extension

1. Three research projects funded by UGC among them 1 have been completed and 2 are ongoing.
2. Six teachers are recognized as research guides by Gondwana University, Gadchiroli and RTMNU Nagpur. 4 scholars have completed Ph.D. under their guidance.
3. The faculty has published 60 research papers in UGC notified journals, 31 research papers in conferences/seminars/workshops proceedings, and 19 books/chapters in various reputed publications.
4. The institution has conducted 1 national level workshop on Intellectual Property Rights (IPR).
5. 4 faculty members have been awarded Ph. D. degree during the last five years.
6. The institution has an NSS unit through which we undertake extension activities in the neighborhood community and help in the holistic development of students and the vicinity.
7. The institution has conducted extension and outreach programs in the collaboration with various stakeholders of the society. Participation in Swachh Bharat Abhiyan, AIDS Awareness, Blood Donation Camps, Gender Issues, etc.
8. Functional 5 MoUs and collaborations are made for field trips, on-the-job training, placements, resource exchanges, etc.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

1. The institution has excellent infrastructure and learning resources including ICT enabled classrooms, seminar halls, fully equipped laboratories, computer laboratories, and other support facilities.
2. It also has the substantial infrastructure required for sports activities like athletics, basketball, volleyball, yoga, weightlifting, etc.
3. The Library is partially automated with the Integrated Library Management System (INFLIBNET (N-List) Software), which houses a sufficient number of books in all disciplines, the collection of rare books, e-books, e-journals, etc.
4. The learning resources like Language laboratory, INFLIBNET, N-List, e-journals, e-books, Knowledge Bank, etc. are available in the library.
5. The Budget for infrastructure, library, and other learning resources is earmarked annually based on the recommendations of respective committees constituted for upgrading, maintaining, and utilizing

physical, academic, and support facilities.

6. There are a sufficient number of UPS's for ensuring power backup.
7. The institution maintains an adequate student-computer ratio (11:1) with a 100 Mbps bandwidth internet connection and campus Wi-Fi facility.
8. The institution has a well-equipped Instrumentation Facility Center (IFC).

Student Support and Progression

1. The institution is having a well-established student support system for financial/scholarship assistance, capability enhancement /development, student progression, and alumni engagement.
2. More than 90% of the students have benefitted from the scholarships and Free ships provided by the Government agencies.
3. The institution has a healthy system to provide support to students for skill development, career counseling, competitive examination guidance, and placement.
4. The institution has provided Rs. 55887/- for the needy and economically weaker students under the Student Welfare Fund.
5. Functional Parent Teacher Association (PTA) and counseling cell to mentor the students regarding academic, career, financial, and stress-related issues.
6. The Placement Cell maintains a strong relationship with co-operative sectors and supports students in placements. Placement cell and skill development programs strengthen student's capabilities and to encourage them for jobs.
7. Reading room facility, INFLIBNET, e-journals, newspapers, magazines, competitive exam guidance, etc. are available for the students who show interest in acquiring higher education and appearing for competitive examinations.
8. In the last five years, 8 students have qualified NET/SET and 4 have qualified competitive examinations.
9. The 20 students have received awards/medals in Institution/University/State level tournaments in various cultural events.
10. The students Council is constituted as per the rules and regulations laid down by the university as and when directed.
11. The institution has a registered Alumni Association having 1,18,873.00 rupees.

Governance, Leadership and Management

1. The vision and mission of the institution correlate with the national policies of higher education and are based on education as a means of development of the poor, needy, and downtrodden aspiring youth of the region.
2. The institution projects its vision and mission through programs and activities such as NSS, Soft Skills Development Program, Awareness Workshops, Seminars, Welfare Schemes, Sports, Career Guidance, etc.
3. The organizational structure of the institution is based on the doctrine and philosophy of Late Shri Balaji Patil Borkar, Founder, Bhartiya Shikshan Sanstha, Nawargaon.
4. The institution promotes a culture of decentralization and participative management through various academic, extra-curricular, and administrative committees.
5. The Principal helps in governing and managing the institution through LMC/CDC, IQAC, and other supportive institution committees.

6. The institution encourages the faculty to participate in Orientation, Refresher, Short Term Courses, and Faculty Development Programs to complete their M. Phil. and Ph. D.
7. Official leaves and financial support are granted to the faculty for attending seminars, workshops, and conferences.
8. The Institution has introduced e-governance in administration, finance, accounts, student admissions, and examinations.
9. The institution has effective welfare measures for teaching and non-teaching staff.
10. The performance of the teaching and non-teaching staff is assessed through the Annual Performance Appraisal System.
11. Faculty orientation programs, seminars, conferences, workshops are organized regularly. Efforts are taken to pull in funds from funding agencies like UGC.
12. During the COVID-19 pandemic month of May, one International Web Conference was organized in association with STAMI (Society for Technologically Advanced Material of India).
13. Awareness quizzes on COVID-19, Administration, and Revised Accreditation Framework were organized during the pandemic,
14. The accounts are audited on regular basis.
15. IQAC undertakes quality sustenance and quality enhancement measures.

Institutional Values and Best Practices

1. Every year the institution organizes Blood Donation and Blood Group Detection Camps and various pathological tests such as HB, AIDS, Thyroid, CBS, etc.
2. Gender Equality Promotion Programs, emphasizing women empowerment, self-protection, laws for women's safety, cyber law, Awareness programs on health and hygiene, etc. are organized regularly in the institution.
3. For girls and boys, a separate common room facility is available on the campus. The girls' common room is provided with a First Aid Box and Sanitary Napkin Vending Machine.
4. The institution has prepared a handbook of a code of conduct and displayed it on the campus.
5. The institution has taken initiative in installing a 2 KVA On-Grid solar power system.
6. The institution campus comprises a rainwater harvesting unit, dug well recharge pits, vermin-composting unit, and Green House Unit in the botanical garden.
7. The Institution observes No Petroleum Vehicle Day, weekly on every Thursday.
8. For differently-abled students, the institution has provided basic amenities such as a ramp and wheelchair.
9. The institution strives hard towards implementing best practices such as Awareness of Legal Activities in the Court, Visit to self-governed awarded ideal village (Lekha Mendha), Commencement of Online Admission Process, VISHAKHA Activity, Land to Lab, Awareness Activity about Sexual Harassment, etc.
10. The institution prepared photographic Flora and Fauna of the campus.
11. The institution conducts a green audit and academic audit.
12. The institution maintains complete transparency in its financial, academic, and auxiliary functions by a participative mechanism.

The faculty members are directed on the academic activities of the institution in the first meeting of the commencement of every academic year. Workload and planning of the curriculum are disseminated as per classes and papers/courses for teaching. Faculty members prepare semester-wise teaching plan for theory and practical at the beginning of every term/semester. Each teacher prepares academic diary containing timetable, workload, daily teaching brief along with academic and administrative committee responsibilities. The concerned Head of Departments and the Principal of the institution monitor the academic diary. The timetable committee prepares a general timetable and HoDs of concerned departments prepare departmental timetable. Teachers conduct classes according to the timetable. Staff meetings are held periodically to review the syllabus completion status. For the effective transmission and delivery of curricula, departments integrate classroom teaching with various ICT tools, laboratory practical, unit tests, field projects, students' seminars, tutorials, home assignments, preliminary examinations, question bank, PPT bank, practical manuals, research projects, field survey etc. For the upgradation of subject-related knowledge, the institution organizes seminars, conferences, and workshops for the teachers. This activity provides a platform to the faculty to participate and interact with experts in various fields and update their subject knowledge. For the effective curriculum delivery, teachers use participative, student-centric learning methods and demonstrate practical as well. Faculty members effectively and creatively use PPTs, video lectures, models, charts to avail subject knowledge to the students. The institution organizes guest lectures of eminent academicians of the vicinity for the effective curriculum delivery to inculcate scientific approach among the students.

The institution also provides special guidance to the slow learners under remedial coaching and avail them books and notes. Besides this, the institution has a mentoring system for academic-related issues.

The central library of the institution provides subjects wise books, INFLIBNET, e-journals, Database, Book Bank facility, reading room facility etc. The institution also provides internet connectivity with campus Wi-Fi facility to the teachers as well as the students for effective teaching and learning.

Teachers provide study material to the students through their notes. Some of the teachers have published textbooks, laboratory manuals, chapters in books etc. The institution conducts the Academic and Administrative Audit (AAA) by the external committee for improvement in the academic and administrative activities. At the end of every academic year, IQAC collects feedback on curricula from the stakeholders, it is then analyzed and report is communicated to the concerned authority.

Academic Calendar is the schedule of the institution for the academic year, which gives details of all academic and administrative events take place into the institution. As the institution is affiliated to Gondwana University, Gadchiroli, it is adhered to the academic calendar published by the university. Before the commencement of every academic year, every department submits details of academic and co-curricular activities to the concern committee in order to prepare academic calendar. The IQAC of the institution plays a very substantial role in maintaining the academic calendar for the conduct of continuous internal evaluation of the students. In the beginning of the academic session, Academic Calendar Committee prepares the academic calendar and makes it available to the students and the faculty. It is also displayed on website for all the stakeholders. The academic calendar specifies the teaching-learning schedule, number of teaching days in each semester, university and institution exam schedule, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities, national days, holidays, camps, excursion and educational tours, field visits, parents-teachers meets, alumni meet, anniversary of founder president, annual gathering, inauguration of various subject societies, guest lectures etc. Only head of the institution can incorporate minor changes in academic calendar. In the beginning of the academic year, the principal of the institution addresses the newly admitted students to make them aware of various facilities, rules and regulations, and examination related activities in Induction Programme. The schedule of all examinations is also given in academic calendar. The teachers announce the syllabus in the beginning of every semester.

The concerning teachers of all the departments conduct unit test after the completion of every unit for the better conducting of CIE. The principal of the institution regularly conducts staff council meetings to ensure the better functioning of the academic and examination-based activities. It is mandatory for the students and the faculty to adhere to the academic calendar for the completion of academic activities. The head of the institution monitors the teaching, learning and evaluation as a continuous process in the institution throughout the academic session. At the end of every semester, as a part of internal assessment, the project under skill enhancement course for sem VI students and home assignment are given to the students before the commencement of term end exam.

The institution is a recognized examination center of Gondwana University to conduct the examinations based on CBCS pattern of the university as per the norms laid down by the university. Most of the teachers in the practical based subjects are the internal and external examiners in the practical examination conducted by the university. Therefore, they follow strictly the teaching plan and time bound delivery of the curriculum to the students and conduct Continuous Internal Evaluation of the students without fail.

1.3 Curriculum Enrichment

1.3.1 Institution integrates crosscutting issues relevant to Professional Ethics ,Gender, Human Values ,Environment and Sustainability into the Curriculum

Response:

The institution imparts the knowledge of Arts and Science faculties through courses of BA, B Sc, M A and M Sc. The institution provides the higher education in this remote and backward region. Professional ethics, gender equity, human values, environment and sustainability are integrated into the curriculum.

Professional Ethics and Human Values:

In order to incorporate these values and ethics, the institution carries out various activities such as national

heroes' anniversaries, Yoga Day, Blood Donation Camps, Awareness Rallies, etc. through NSS, Student Development Cell, and other committees.

Gender Sensitivity and Equality:

Institution never discriminates among boys and girl students and promotes all to participate in every extracurricular and co-curricular activities like Annual Social Gathering, NSS, Sports and the University Level Cultural program like '*Indradhanushya*', etc.

It is found that, students are very enthusiastic to participate in the special annual camp of NSS organized at the adopted village. Various activities are organized like Cleanliness, Soil and Water Conservation Campaign, Blood Donation, Tree Plantation, Wild-life Conservation, Foeticide Awareness Campaign, Plastic Eradication, Use of organic fertilizers etc.

In the institution, various programs are conducted to develop the personality and health of the students. Legal advisors, doctors and psychologists are invited to guide the students. As health is very important for girls, female doctors are invited for medical check-up and guidance about nutritious diet, cleanliness, exercise, hygiene etc.

Programs on Women Empowerment are organized in the institution. Workshop on '*Cyber Security & Safety Measures*' and competition on '*Awareness of Legal Laws for Girls*' are also organized. International Women's Day is observed. Internal Complaint Committee (ICC) has put a special complaint box in the campus to lodge any written complaint to avoid the nuisance. A set of CCTV cameras at every important spot in the premises for the safety of the girls and Sanitary Napkin Vending machine are installed.

Human Values: As the institution is named after Sant Dnyaneshwar, the institution observes '*Sanjeevan Samadhi Sohala*' every year to spread the message of universal peace and harmony. Renowned orators are invited to spread the message of human values, equality, fraternity and religious morals. The institution organizes '*Yuva Din*' (12th Jan) to pay homage to Swami Vivekanand by organizing guest lectures of the eminent speakers. To promote students, the important place of books in the life, '*Vaachan Prerna Din*' (15th Oct) is marked in the institution every year.

Environment and Sustainability:

The institution has offered Environmental Studies as a credit based subject at the undergraduate level. The institution conducts environmental awareness programmes like tree plantation and plants species preservation, Ozone Layer Conservation Day (16th Sept), World Wetland Day (2nd Feb), rainwater harvesting, village cleanliness, plastic-free drives etc.

The institution observes 'No Vehicle Day' on every Thursday.

Initiatives are taken in solid, liquid and chemical waste management. The institution has installed 2 kVA

roof top solar power plant, and LED bulbs to save energy and minimize environmental pollution. Green audit is done by external agency.

2.2 Catering to Student Diversity

2.2.1 The institution assesses the learning levels of the students and organises special Programmes for advanced learners and slow learners

Response:

In every educational institution, the students often referred to as 'learners' and they are the most important stakeholders. The admissions of the students to various programs in the institution are purely on the first come first serve basis and as per the government reservation policy. During their course, the teachers further assess them by adopting various teaching methodologies.

- The institution has adopted the method of checking the academic performance of the students and communicating with the teacher (mentor).
- Each student is given personal attention to his/her academic performance.

1. Identification Process

- The identification of advanced learners and slow learners is based on their academic performance in the previous year examinations.
- By conducting class/unit tests on a regular basis, the performance of the student is evaluated.
- Mentors play a very significant role in the identification process. The ratio of admitted students and teachers is analyzed. Each teacher (Mentor) is given the responsibility of the allotted mentees with whom they be in touch and interact personally to understand academic and personal problems.

1. For slow learners:

There are various reasons that make the learner slow in learning. The observed fundamental reason for such slow learners in our institution is their socio-economically backward and rural background. Due to this background, problems like Dysphasia/Aphasia, Dyslexia, Dysgraphia, lack of exposure, physical fitness, inferiority complex etc are occurred. To overcome these issues, the institution conducts remedial/extra classes, parent-teacher meet, classroom seminars, and guest lectures. The teachers of the institutions give home assignments, monitor their class attendance, provide question papers of previous examinations and the performance of the students is communicated to their parents on regular basis.

1. For advanced learners:

To give advanced learners a platform to develop themselves, the institution provides an open-access facility in the library through an internet resource center; more books are provided to such students. The

teachers always motivate the students to participate in quiz competitions, seminars, group discussions, etc. By organizing quiz competitions and group discussions, the institution gives them an opportunity to expand their horizons. The institution also encourages them to participate in inter-collegiate, inter-university competitions and research festival 'Aavishkar', a joint venture of the university and Govt. of Maharashtra. To give a platform to express their innermost ideas by writing articles, poems, stories, etc, the institution provides the opportunity in the form of an annual magazine. Wi-Fi facility is also provided to the students to update their knowledge.

1. Specific Outcome:

The target group of the slow learners showed improvement in the knowledge of concerned subjects and scored better marks in the university examination while advanced learners showed better performance in the knowledge of concerned subjects and scored better marks in the university examination. It is found that they participated in classroom interactions and discussions actively and sent to participate in seminars, quizzes, and cultural competitions organized by other institutions. Some of them bagged prizes also.

2.3 Teaching- Learning Process

2.3.1 Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences

Response:

The institution offers a student-centric learning environment where the students can explore, experience, and create their own perspective. The vision and mission statements of the institution clearly state that it is serving devotedly in the area of higher education for socio-economically backward strata of the society. Apart from traditional methods, the institution focuses on conceptual clarity with the help of technology. Teachers demonstrate to elaborate on the difficult concepts in their local context as well as ICT tools.

Methods of teaching:

Experiential Learning:

By engaging in experiential content of teaching as subject-related activities, the faculty members promote the learning environment. The students are encouraged to participate in exhibitions and other activities related to their subjects and create their science models.

Laboratory exercise:

As recommended by the university laboratory exercise is performed by the science students individually as well as in groups. The teachers observe the results of the experiments and supportive knowledge.

Projects and Dissertation:

These are mandatory for all the PG courses of science faculty and UG (BA III). The process in projects and dissertations follows literature review, data collection, testing of hypotheses, data analysis & interpretation, and project report writing. It also makes them ready for research and gives them the first-hand feel of the challenges that uplift them in the field to work towards enhancement of the existing level of their knowledge.

Assignments:

Home assignments are compulsory for all the students of all the programs.

Excursion and Educational Tour: Tour is part of the curriculum for all the students in the Science stream. The concerned departments organize study tours every year.

Participative Learning:

To encourage the students, the institution directs all the departments to promote the students to involve in participative learning. Departmental societies give the opportunity to the maximum students. Various activities like quiz-contests, seminars and quiz competitions, lectures of the experts, workshops, etc. are conducted.

Every year, National Science Day, Ozone Layer Conservation Day, Mathematics Day, World Wetland Day, Vaachan Prerna Diwas, Constitution Day, Library Day, Teachers' Day, etc are observed where all the students get opportunities to explore their knowledge. The institution also encourages and promotes the students to participate in the research festival 'Aavishkar', an important research event.

Problem-Solving Method:

The institution offers Skill Oriented Certificate Course 'Vermicomposting' that helps students in preparing them for self-employment. One Add On course 'Importance of Marathi Grammar in

Competitive Exams' approved by executive management helps the students to prepare them for competitive exams.

For the late admitted students, extra lectures are conducted.

For enhancing the communicative skill in English, the institution has installed Language Lab.

Remedial Classes are held in the institution for weaker students. They are counseled by the teachers and further are assessed to note their progress. In all the subjects, experts are invited by the institution to deliver their deliberation as guest lecturers. Tutorial classes in some subjects help weaker students to enhance their study.

Students Welfare Fund helps the economically weaker students by providing study material, bicycles, wave off in fees, etc.

2.3.2 Teachers use ICT enabled tools for effective teaching-learning process.

Response:

We believe that ICT can lead improving the teacher for better teaching methods and the student for better learning. The institution realized the fact that an increase in student exposure to educational ICT through curriculum integration can create a significant and positive impact on student achievement, especially in terms of 'Knowledge Comprehension' and 'Practical skill' in all subject areas. For this, the role of the teacher must change in the sense that it is no longer sufficient for teachers merely to impart content knowledge. It will, however, be crucial for teachers to encourage critical thinking skills, promote information literacy, and nurture collaborative working practices to prepare students for a new world in which no job is guaranteed for life and where people switch careers several times. By taking into account all these facts, the institution inspires teachers and students to get friendly with ICT teaching tools. To make ICT teaching more effective, the institution availed facilities with the basic acceptable infrastructure including stable and affordable internet connectivity.

Following ICT teaching and learning tools are available in our institution:

1. There are four ICT enabled classrooms which are equipped with smart podium enabled with the computer, LCD projectors, sound system, visualizer, LAN connection, and interactive whiteboards that allow projecting computer images to be displayed.
2. The language lab is functional in the institution enabled with 20 computers, one server, and a LAN network.

3. The institution has installed a Wi-Fi unit for the students inside the campus.
4. All laboratories are well equipped with LCD projectors and screens.
5. The institution issued separate PCs to each department.
6. Network Resource Center with two computers is available for the students.
7. Some teachers conduct online tests through Google forms, Testmoz, etc as and when required.
8. PPT bank of each teacher is displayed on the institution's website. All departments use PPT and multimedia to simplify the syllabus in a more effective way.
9. The faculty of language departments regularly writes blogs.
10. To fulfill the students' and teachers' needs with the changing scenario, the library is regularly updated with online resources. INFLIBNET (N-LIST) and allied e-resources are made available free of cost. It has a good number of e-journals and e-books.
11. The central library has a cloud-based library automation software LIB-Man which is a fully integrated, user-friendly, multi-user package for computerization of all the in-house operations of the Library. Lib-Man is embedded with Multi-lingual Fonts, Barcode & QR Code Fonts.
12. Social media is skillfully used by the institution through its YouTube, What's App, Telegram, Facebook, etc. Some of the links are visible on the home page of the institution website.
13. The institution encourages teachers to attend orientation courses, refresher courses, FDPs, webinars, workshops, seminars, and conferences related to ICT use or innovation in teaching-learning.
14. The institution organized *International Web Conference 2020* during the pandemic.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 Mechanism of internal assessment is transparent and robust in terms of frequency and mode

Response:

CIE (Continuous Internal Evaluation) is an important parameter of the teaching-learning process of any institution. In our institution, it is robust, ICT enabled, and transparent. Surprise tests, unit tests and classroom seminars on the syllabus are carried out in all the semesters. Terminal examinations are conducted before the commencement of the university examination. The pattern of the question papers strictly adheres to the question paper pattern of the university. The Schedule of the terminal exam is prepared and displayed on the notice board as well as on the Whats App groups of the classes. Home and class assignments are assigned to the students for their proper acknowledgment. Online tests are conducted and the results are displayed after the evaluation as and when required. The students are directed to prepare and present PowerPoint Presentations on allotted topics in front of their classes. Attendance plays a very important role in the teaching-learning process, hence the institution insists the students their regular attendance.

Practical examinations in science subjects are conducted in the presence of internal as well as external examiners duly appointed by the university. Group discussions on important topics are conducted in all semesters. Online quizzes prove the ability of the students in the use of technology and their knowledge. Educational and excursion tours are organized to enhance their experiential knowledge. Projects are made compulsory for BA semester II and B Sc Semester IV students on 'Environmental Studies' and BA semester VI students on 'Research Methodology'.

The institution organizes Parent-Teacher Meet where the parents along with teachers get an opportunity to share and discuss the progress and problems of the students. Thus, it can be inferred that all the above practices, which are being followed at the institution are robust in nature as far as frequency and transparency are concerned.

The institution invites alumni members annually for interaction with the teachers as well as students. The alumni also give suggestions for betterment in the mechanism of internal assessment. The institution tries to follow possible suggestions.

2.5.2 Mechanism to deal with internal/external examination related grievances is transparent, time-bound and efficient

Response:

Internal Exam:

The institution conducts tutorials, home assignments, unit tests, presentations, seminars, terminal exams, etc. to assess the performance of the students. The examination committee of the institution executes internal exams in a very meticulous manner. In order to conduct practical exams, internal and external examiners are appointed by the affiliating university. The students are free to use the suggestion box to lodge their grievances regarding exams. The answer sheets of unit tests and terminal exams are handed over to the students after assessment. The students go through the answer sheets and know their performance regarding the strengths and weaknesses of their studies and techniques in writing answers. Hence, for the students in the institution, there is very little scope for grievances regarding evaluation. The institution communicates through postcards to the parents of the students who fail to attempt the tests/terminal exams or get dissatisfied scores.

External Exam (University Exam):

For the redressal of external examination related grievances of the students, the institution has established a student's friendly mechanism. All such grievances are monitored with transparency and in a time-bound manner. The institution suggests such students to follow the university procedures. The students, who suffer from under-valuation, are guided about the procedures regarding the procurement of challenge forms, xerox copies of their solved answer sheets, university theory examinations related problems, and so on. The proper online filling up of the university examination forms is also monitored by the staff. The office staff member is sent to the university to follow up on the grievances if any. The respective subject teachers discuss the answer sheets, nature of the answers expected and tries to assess whether the marks given are appropriate or not. If there is a chance of an increase in marks, they are guided about applying for re-assessment.

The university has designed objectives for all the programs and uploaded on the university website. The institution has clearly stated course outcomes of all the programs. The link of the syllabi of offered courses is made available on the institution website. All these outcomes have been prepared very meticulously by discussing with the concerned faculty members taking into consideration the syllabus prescribed by Gondwana University and uploaded on the website. Course outcomes are discussed with the students in the concerning departmental societies and they are available on the website. All these outcomes are conveyed to the parents and alumni in PTM and Alumni Meet.

The institution permits teachers to participate in workshops, seminars, conferences and FDPs to enrich them to attain the outcomes. More than 50% of the faculty members were the members of BoS (Board of Studies) of the affiliated university during the last five years. Additionally, with the launching of the CBCS pattern, the institution organized workshops on the revised syllabus (CBCS) in 2016-17 for all the subjects of science stream in collaboration with the affiliated university. The teachers in the institution actively participate in such workshops on the restructuring of the whole curriculum organized by other institutions of the affiliated university.

The POs and COs are displayed on the institution's website and are available for all stakeholders. At the commencement of every academic session, an induction program is organised to make the first-year students aware of the various aspects of their programme and course outcomes.

At the first meeting with the students of their class, the concerned teachers discuss the course outcomes and give them a brief idea about the topics to be covered during the semester and give them a list of reference books that they need to refer to. The students are also informed about the possible career opportunities after graduation and post-graduation.

3.2.1 Institution has created an ecosystem for innovations and has initiatives for creation and transfer of knowledge

Response:

Although the institution does not have a recognized incubation center, however, promotes encouragement and endorses an ecosystem for innovation and improvisation by faculty members and research students. The institution has started PG courses in 2019-20 in Chemistry, Physics, Zoology, Economics, Political Science and History subjects on purely non-grants basis.

The institution is equipped with sufficient infrastructure and a legacy of highly qualified and academically active faculty members. It's a matter of pride for the institution that 8 faculties were members of prestigious academic bodies of the affiliating university in the last five years. One of the non-teaching staffs is the member of 'Senate body' and also working as a member of 'Grievance Redressal Committee' of the university.

Although the institution does not possess Ph D recognised centre however there are 6 faculty members are Ph.D. supervisors and under their able guidance 9 research students are perusing their Ph Ds. 3 have submitted and 4 research students have been awarded Ph D till date.

During last five years, 3 MRPs by Dept of Physics, Dept of Marathi and Dept of Mathematics have been carried out. About 60 research papers are published in reputed journals (UGC - care list journals), credited to the institution. Thus, the institution has willfully created an ecosystem for transfer of knowledge.

Faculty members also share their knowledge as experts to students and other firms via You Tube Channels, PPTs etc. The central library of the institution is enriched with 21099 textbooks, 4591 reference books, 135000 e-books, 10000 e-journals, 25 journals, 25 CDs & Video. Notably, 06 faculty members have contributed in the publication of 19 books with ISBN numbers and chapters in books.

The departments in the institution have taken initiation in the formation of departmental libraries for additional transfer of the knowledge and quick referencing. The departmental societies of the institution organise educational and excursion tours to get extra knowledge regarding their subjects. Laboratories in the institution are well equipped with Visible Spectrophotometer, Soil Testing Kit, Rotor flask shaker, Magnetic stirrer with hot plate, pH METER, Microtome, Binocular Microscope, Hot Air Oven, Flame Photometer-1 & 2, Dissecting Light Microscope, Centrifuge, Incubator, Traveling Microscope three direction, Spectroscope, Planck Constant Apparatus, Mosfet Characteristics Apparatus, Monostable Astable & Bistable Multivibrators using transistors, Millikans oil drop Method apparatus, Determination of specific heat apparatus, CRO and Oscillator, Bifilar Suspension, Clemet & Desormes Apparatus etc. which facilitate the students and teachers to use modern technologies for their research. Some of the classrooms are fixed with a digital podium and LCD projectors. Thus, the ecosystem in institution is instrumental in enhancing the knowledge.

4.1 Physical Facilities

4.1.1 The Institution has adequate infrastructure and physical facilities for teaching- learning. viz., classrooms, laboratories, computing equipment etc.

Response:

- The institution is situated in the lap of beautiful nature. The campus area is spacious with 7 acres of land surrounded by greenery.
- The institution is running UG and PG in Arts and Science both. There are altogether 12 departments including 6 in Arts, 5 in Science and a Physical Education.
- The main building of the institution consists of Principal's Cabin, Administrative Office, IQAC, Common Staff Room, Girls Common Room, Department of Physical Education, Sociology, English, Economics, Pol Science, History and Marathi; all the departments are well equipped with LAN and PCs.
- In main building, there are altogether 15 Classrooms out of them two are equipped with LCD projectors, NSS office, a Girls Common Room attached with toilet and equipped with functional Sanitary Napkin Vending Machine, a Boys Common Room, Toilets for staff and boys.
- Stage is available for the students to conduct outdoor cultural activities.
- Two Water Purifiers for safe drinking water facility, Exam Room and Conference Hall.
- The institution has spacious, well furnished auditorium '*Pasaydan*' equipped with 300 chairs and good quality sound system.
- Two Classrooms enabled with ICT infrastructure and a room with smart board.
- There are 7 laboratories in the institution equipped with requisite instruments for UG and PG. There are 4 departments including Chemistry, Physics, Botany and Zoology attached to the labs and a separate department of Mathematics.
- The central library of the institution is well furnished with more than collection of 29,000 books including textbooks, reference books, rare books, encyclopedias, dictionaries, journals, periodicals, etc. There is an independent reading room in the library. Internet Resource Centre for the students, newspapers, e-books, e-journals, etc are available. The library has been using cloud-based software '*LIB-Man*' for accession of the books.
- The institution runs an independent wing for competitive exams '*Entry in Services*'. The centre has a vast collection of competitive exam books along with 24 X 7 reading room facility.
- The institution has 'Computer Centre' with 20 PCs equipped with internet facility for all the students.
- The Language Lab with 17 PCs having ETNL software for the students to improve their communication skills.
- UGC sanctioned *Girls' Hostel* with Mess, Dining Hall, Warden's Office, Visitors' Room, and Sick Room is available.
- Botanical Garden with 50 plant species, which exhibit biodiversity, is situated inside the premises of the institution.

Sanitary work, cleaning of classrooms, auditorium, conference room, etc is done through the sweepers on daily wages basis.

Science Laboratories:

There are adequate laboratory assistants in the Science Departments viz. Physics, Chemistry, Botany, and Zoology to maintain the equipment and laboratories. Computers and network facilities are maintained and serviced by agencies as and when need arises. The stock in the labs is verified annually, and damaged ones are discarded. Electrical and Electronic equipment are checked regularly at the end of every semester. Issue and Breakage registers are maintained in the laboratories.

Computer maintenance:

The 72 computers and 3 laptops are available in Administrative offices, Departments and Laboratories are maintained through outsources.

Classrooms:

The classroom facilities such as blackboards, electrical fittings and furniture, etc. are regularly maintained by the administration.

Library:

The Librarian, ably assisted by two library assistants who look after the maintenance of the library books, journals, periodicals, furniture, electronic equipments, computers and software. The librarian co-ordinates with the administration to ensure that maintenance is done regularly. Weeding of books is done on a regular basis. Pest Management measures are carried out in the library.

Reading room is made available for the students in the central library. Besides, for competitive examinations aspirants, the institution provided a separate 24 x 7 reading room with more than 1000 books which are exclusively based on competitive exams.

Internet Resource Center:

The institution has provided Internet Resource Center to access the internet facility for the students.

Sports:

Department of Physical Education observes the sports activities in the institution regularly. The institution has a huge playground for different games which are regularly cleaned and well maintained by support staff. A well equipped gymnasium is available for the students.

Power generation and energy conservation:

The administrative building is connected through a 15 kVA generators to provide uninterrupted power supply. Two solar power plants with total capacity of 2 kVA. The worn out electrical fittings are replaced with the new ones as and when required.

Water supply:

There are 3 Reverse Osmosis (RO) water units supplying drinkable water. The RO units are cleaned and maintained on a regular basis. The four tanks and a dug well are maintained.

Medical facilities:

The institution has a good network with local clinics which provide service in case of emergency. Sick room is made available in the girls hostel. Health check-up camps are organised in the institution. Blood Donation and Blood Group Detection Camps are organised by the institution twice a year (on the eve of Late Balaji Patil Borkar death anniversary, 30th of August and in NSS camp).

Rain Water Harvesting:

Rain Water Harvesting Unit is installed.

Parking Facilities:

Adequate parking facilities for bicycles, and two wheelers are available.

Security:

The security is observed by a security guard duly appointed in the institution. CCTV's is installed at 8 prime locations of the campus.

Cafeteria:

A cafeteria is available in the campus for the students and the staff. The required refreshments are made available for all. A part of the canteen is resemblance with a cottage. The administration monitors the hygiene of the cafeteria.

Internal Complaint Committee (ICC):

As the institution has more number of girl students, a special attention is given to the complaints of the students. To spread the awareness on gender equality, cyber security, awareness of legal laws for women etc. the ICC organises programs throughout the year. Sanitary Napkin Vending Machine is also installed in

the girls' common room.

Students Welfare Fund:

The fund is generated by the teachers of the institution and the management for the poor and needy students. Such students are provided bicycles, admission fees, hostel fees, exam fees, uniforms, books, educational materials, medical ailments etc through this fund.

Responsibilities are assigned to the HoDs in conducting seminars, classwork, distribution of work, the inclusion of new and innovative experiments, educational and excursion tours, etc. The administrative staff is allotted different responsibilities for administrative work. The Practice: The Golden Jubilee Function was celebrated for three days. Well-known and esteemed academicians were invited as guests. All the associated ex-principals, ex-teaching, and non-teaching staff, and the citizens were invited. To make the golden jubilee year memorable, the institution decided to organize various activities throughout the session 2018-19. As per the guidelines of the IQAC, the cultural committee instructed the sub-committees to perform various duties for the success of the events such as State Level NSS Camp, Senior Citizen Workshop, State level workshop on Constitutional Binding and Judiciary, University Level Debate Competition, University Level Research Festival 'Aavishkar', Workshop on Legal Laws for Women, and Visit along with Interview of a well-known Actor Mr Shantanu Rode (Mumbai), etc. It was found that effective leadership is experienced when the administration decentralizes responsibilities from top to bottom level. 6.2 Strategy Development and Deployment

6.2.1 The institutional Strategic / Perspective plan is effectively deployed

Response:

Our institution strategically plans activities and executes them in a planned manner. The activities are decentralized at four levels as departmental, administrative, academic, and financial.

At the departmental level, academic strategic plans are made before the commencement of academic session by preparing the academic calendar of that year taking into consideration the university's calendar.

Administrative committees that are formed at the beginning of the session are responsible for all student and staff related activities.

The most successful example of such implementation is the strategic planning done by IQAC with respect to creating resources for improving the teaching-learning environment and infrastructure. IQAC submitted the institutional development plan to various funding institutes such as RUSA, Department of Higher and Technical Education Maharashtra State Government.

Strategic plan: IQAC suggests the head of the institution for the requirements regarding infrastructure, facelift of laboratories, up-gradation of classrooms besides provision, and augmentation of various facilities for students. Thereafter the head of the institution put on the table this proposal in CDC meetings. After considering the demands, the CDC and the executive body fulfill them.

Implementation:

1. In 2015-16, Rs. 1,23,309 were utilized for consumable Laboratory items.
2. In 2016-17, Rs. 1,25,791 were utilized for consumable Laboratory items, Software (Mastersoft ERP Solution Pvt. Ltd. Nagpur) for online student registration with Short Message services (82850), Blue star WC-SDLX 680 (Phoenix industries-Nagpur) Microscope (34000).
3. In 2017-18, Rs. 1,49,102 were utilized for consumable Laboratory items, Steel cupboards (34000), Abbes refractometer, Refractometer Scale, Sugar Scale with complete set (30515), Digital conductivity meter with complete set (18920), Digital Potentiometer with complete set (20165), Soil Testing Kit (22400), Canon Camera (34000).
4. In 2018-19, Rs. 3,06,655 were utilized for consumable Laboratory items.

5. In 2019-20, expenditure on Laboratory equipment and chemicals is 1,88,765.

College Construction Committee

After the second cycle of NAAC, executive management worked upon the recommendations of NAAC and the facelift of all the laboratories, additional classrooms, ICT rooms, Auditorium, independent reading room, etc. (Executive Management Body)

Introduction of New Courses:

To fulfill the need of graduate students of this region, the institution introduced six PG courses in Chemistry, Zoology, Physics (Science) and History, Pol. Science and Economics (Arts). The institution also introduced one Add-on course in Marathi 'Importance of Marathi Grammar in Competitive Examinations'.

Registration of Alumni Association:

As per the recommendation of the NAAC, the existing Alumni Association was registered under the Act. of Maharashtra govt.

Special State Level NSS Camp:

To commemorate the golden jubilee of the institution, a state-level NSS Camp comprised of 225 volunteers across various universities from all over Maharashtra was successfully organized.

6.2.2 The functioning of the institutional bodies is effective and efficient as visible from policies, administrative setup, appointment and service rules, procedures, etc.

Response:

Bhartiya Shikshan Sanstha, Nawargaon (BSS) established in 1950 is the apex governing body of the institution. Shri Dnyanesh Mahavidyalaya was established in the year 1968 and is the only higher educational institution run by the parent Sanstha. The executive management of BSS approves and monitors the policies and plans for the development of the institution. It comprised of President, Vice-President, Secretary, and 6 other members.

Local Management Committee/College Development Committee:

Local Management Committee (LMC), constituted according to the Maharashtra University Act, 1994 and reconstituted with the name College Development Committee (CDC) as per Maharashtra University Act, 2016. It sanctions annual budget and financial statements, discusses the academic progress of the institution, suggests the administration for the up-gradation of the teaching-learning process, new appointments, augmentation of the infrastructure, facelift of the laboratories with the introduction of new PG courses and maintenance, etc.

Principal and Institution Administration:

The principal is the chief administrative officer and monitors administrative and academic activities. Office Superintendent and office staff help the principal in the administrative matters whereas heads and faculty members of all the departments in the teaching-learning process, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities. The administration observes works related to admissions, examinations, scholarships, daily correspondence with the university, concerning government offices, etc. On the academic front, the principal forms various committees for monitoring and facilitating several activities organized in the institution. A list of various committees is mentioned in the prospectus for general information. The prospectus is uploaded to the institution's website.

Service Rules, Procedures, Recruitment, and Promotion:

The institution follows the rules and regulations of the UGC, Revised Maharashtra Public University Act: 2016, and Gondwana University, Gadchiroli for the recruitment and grievances redressal. The promotional policy of the institution is transparent and impartial. The promotional procedure for teaching faculty is based on PBAS recommended by UGC and the affiliated university. IQAC monitors and co-operates in the process of the Career Advancement Scheme (CAS).

The Confidential Reports of non-teaching staff is prepared by the head of the institution and sanctioned by CDC for promotion to higher positions.

Grievance Redressal Mechanism:

- The institution has formed a Grievance Redressal Committee for faculty, staff, and students to redress their grievances to resolve. The Principal is the head of this cell and other mechanisms to deal with the situation. After receiving grievances and complaints, either in writing or oral form, the committee conducts a meeting to discuss the issues and to resolve them.
- To prevent cases of sexual harassment and to look into grievances of girl students, the institution has constituted Internal Complaint Committee (ICC) as per the norms of the National Commission

for Women, Govt. of India.

- The anti-Ragging committee is also formed to resolve the cases related to ragging if any.

6.3.5 Institutions Performance Appraisal System for teaching and non-teaching staff

Response:

The institution directs all the teaching staff to submit a Performance Based Appraisal System (PBAS) each year based on the performance appraisal norms suggested by the UGC and affiliated university. The placements for the next scale or grade are done as per the circulars received from Joint Director (JD) office. The proposals of all eligible faculties are forwarded to the JD office through IQAC and principal for placements and promotions. The staff members have received their due placements after fulfilling the necessary eligibility criteria.

The submitted data concerning faculty is taken under consideration for further placements and promotions. The responsibilities of the various committees performed by the faculty members are assessed every year. The Principal also contributes to personal observations and interactions with the faculty members as a measure of performance assessment.

Research contributions like the publication of books, chapter in books, editing books, research articles, major and minor research projects, invited talks, etc. contribute to PBAS.

It is a regular practice of the institution to take feedback on the teachers from the students every year. The feedback is analyzed statistically by the IQAC at the end of every academic session.

Like the teaching staff, the institution follows the systematic procedure for performance appraisal of the non-teaching staff. Annual Confidential Reports (CR) is filled by the principal based on their performance and compliance with the orders of the administration. The Head of all the departments with which the non-teaching staff is associated is taken into confidence while preparing the CRs. These CRs are verified by the Principal with his cautiousness and sent to the Joint Director for further procedure. On the basis of seniority, the promotion of non-teaching

staff is concerned, their pay fixation is carried out as per G.R. SANKIRNA 2009/(326/09) dated 7th October 2009.

The institution carries out its academic and administrative audits from external agencies and affiliated universities. Therefore, each task is completed with quality performance and documentation by the institution. 6.5.1 Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) has contributed significantly for institutionalizing the quality assurance strategies and processes

Response:

In order to sustain and improve the quality of the institution, the IQAC constantly reviews the strategies and processes with the establishment of IQAC in the institution in 2009. It has been striving hard to improve the quality culture by channelized efforts towards promoting overall performance.

The IQAC has brought a change in the institution by organizing various programs like- National Seminar on IPR, International Workshop with STAMI, Workshop on RAAF, Farmers Workshop, Avishkar Research Festival, Workshop on Research Methodology, Senior Citizen Workshop, Gender Sensitization, Women Empowerment, etc.

The two initiatives are as follow:

Practice 1: Quality Assurance Strategy in Academics

As per one of the recommendations of the NAAC peer team in the second cycle (2015), the IQAC has been emphasizing promoting the quality culture of research amongst the faculty members. As a result, four faculty members of the institution were awarded a Ph.D. during the last five years. Due to the continual insistence of the IQAC, more than 45 quality research papers were published into different renowned

research journals and some books were also published by the senior faculty members. Many research papers were published and presented in proceedings of national and international seminars and conferences. This research contribution of the faculties is presented in front of management members, principal, and all the faculty members. This presentation encourages newly appointed faculty members to enhance their research contributions.

Practice 2: Students Support Mechanism

Due to consistent efforts of the IQAC, the institution has launched PG programs and one Add-on course in Marathi. In the year 2019-20, the institution submitted proposals for four skill enhancement certificate courses and in response, they were sanctioned by the affiliating university to introduce the courses in the year 2020-21. Thus they can fulfill the academic demand of our students who belong to the socio-economical and backward region. IQAC also was taken under consideration the importance of Academic and Administrative Audit (AAA) because of this, from the year 2018, the institution prepared AAA through an external agency. The complete statistical data of teaching, non-teaching, students, grants, etc. is available on a single click. The Green Audit is also carried out by the institution and certified by an external agency to promote the Environment Management and Conservation in the College Campus.

Through IQAC, the institution time to time reviews and continuously upgrades the quality of the teaching-learning process by way of enhanced academic research, effective training, and feedback system. The institution implements the updated syllabus as per the university norms. Some of the faculty members in the institution are the members of BoS, Gondwana University, Gadchiroli. Thus, the institution has a noteworthy contribution to the designing of the syllabus.

1. Teaching-Learning Reforms through ICT:

The institution encourages the faculty to utilize the modern Information and Communication Technology (ICT) tools such as smart classrooms, Google classrooms, PowerPoint presentations, audio components, etc. for effective classroom teaching. Projects, assignments, classroom seminars, GD, field visits, and presentations are made mandatory as parts of the courses in order to motivate the students to gain practical knowledge and to enhance the necessary skills that are required for their academic development. The

advanced learners are motivated to participate in inter-collegiate competitions and slow learners/ late admitted students are given remedial coaching. In keeping pace with the requirements of the tech-savvy generation of students, the campus is made Wi-Fi enabled. All laboratories have been completely face-lifted and new laboratories are constructed to fulfill the need of the PG students.

The library is equipped with INFLIBNET, N-LIST, and bar-coding. Internet Resource Center is operational in the library for the students.

The institution is equipped with overhead and LCD projectors. Smart Boards are available in ICT classrooms. Faculty and students are encouraged to use these aids regularly.

1. Evaluation of Students through Examinations:

The examination is the best criterion to evaluate the students' performance. All the departments conduct unit tests, surprise tests, classroom seminars, GD, projects, assignments, etc. At the end of each semester, the institution conducts a terminal examination. The performance of the students is evaluated by the valuation of answer sheets and the results are declared after valuation. The 20% internal assessment marks are given to the students on the basis of attendance, tests, seminars, and home assignments.

The institution has collaborated with national and inter-university institutes in the form of MoUs. This practice provides opportunities to the students to participate in academic events organized by these institutions.

The special activity, 'Vayaat Yetana' (On the Threshold of Adolescence) for the female students is organized to acknowledge them about hormonal changes and their effects on the body.

The institution promotes the female students to participate in all the curricular and extra-curricular activities conducted throughout the year like annual gathering, NSS, inter-collegiate competitions, excursion tours etc.

A. Solid Waste Management:

For collecting the solid wastes, different colored dustbins are kept in every nook and corner of the campus. Students and faculties are advised to use these dustbins. It is processed as per the nature of the waste. The institution has an operational vermicompost unit in which the biodegradable solid waste is collected and utilized. To segregate solid waste, blue-colored dust bins are kept for dry waste and green colored dust bins are used for wet waste. Leaf litter from trees in the premises are left undisturbed for decomposition and vermicomposting. After the vermicompost is ready in due course it is harvested and used for plants on the campus. Dry waste mainly leaf litter is allowed to decompose systematically over a period. Wooden scraps found on campus are reused in mending damaged furniture. Paper waste management is actively working and sells waste Newspapers to vendors for recycling at regular intervals. NSS regularly conducts campus-cleaning drives, and also help to segregate waste after college events.

B. Liquid Waste Management:

The liquid waste generated in all the laboratories especially the chemistry laboratories is disposed of.

C. E-waste:

As part of its eco-friendly practices, the institution tries to manage all types of waste as efficiently as possible. E-waste is disposed of through the write-off procedure.

The institution is established in the year 1968 and is one of the oldest institutions in the district, situated at gram panchayat level rendering higher education. It has a rich heritage of tolerance and harmony towards cultural, regional, linguistic, communal socio-economic, and other diversities right from its establishment.

The admitted students in the institution are local; belong to nearby villages having an agricultural background. Notably, most of the students belong to backward categories.

The institution regularly organizes a variety of cultural activities for inculcating the values of tolerance, harmony towards cultural diversities in the region. The institution organized a mega event '**Lokakala Mahotsav**' to exhibit typical *Zadipatti* art forms like *Gondi Dhemsas Dance*, *Zadtya*, *Jatyawarchi Gani*, *Rownyachi Geete*, *Holichi Geete*, etc. These activities have a very positive impact on socio-cultural beliefs. Birth anniversaries of great national heroes are observed to inspire the students. National festivals, awareness rallies, and government campaigns are regularly observed in the institution.

The state-level award recipient NSS Unit of the institution has carried out various social activities for the last many years. The special State Level Camp was organized where 225 volunteers, having linguistic and regional diversities, across all the corners of Maharashtra participated. The NSS unit conducts a special camp annually at the adopted village where the villagers are acknowledged through awareness rallies, guest lectures, cultural programmes, constructing bunds, tree plantation, blood donation, health check-ups, etc.

To maintain the linguistic importance, the institution observes *Marathi Rajbhasha Din*, *Vaachan Prerna Din*, the project on Collection of Vocabulary from local dialect *Kurmar*, Language Lab activity, etc.

The institution is located at Eastern Vidarbha Zone of Maharashtra, which is famous for paddy cultivation. The institution has collaborated with National Rice Research Centre, Sindewahi. 7.2 Best Practices

7.2.1 Describe two best practices successfully implemented by the Institution as per NAAC format provided in the Manual.

Response:

Best Practices in the institution

Practice: I

1. Title of the Practice: Students' Welfare Fund

2. Objectives of the Practice:

- To assist the students with economic help to backward, poor and needy but good in academic performance
- To help the students in case of a medical emergency
- To provide the needy students with learning aids and other equipment

1. The Context

The area in which the institution is established is remote & socio-economically known to be a backward area, due to which the student coming in the institution is having a lot of difficulties. To tackle this problem to some extent, the faculty members of the institution came forward to assist the victims of poverty. Hence, all the faculty members in the institution decided to establish the 'Students' Welfare Fund'. By this activity, the institution also approached the executive management of BSS to raise a helping hand in this noble venture. To fulfill the need of such students 'Students' Welfare Fund' is raised every year by the institution.

1. The Practice

In the meeting of the staff council, the issue of establishment of the 'Students' Welfare Fund' scheme was tabled for discussion and the rules and regulations were incorporated. The committee was constituted under the coordinator-ship of Dr. A. T. Mungmode.

Accordingly, all the faculty members have been depositing Rs. 1000/- and Rs. 5000/- from BSS per annum as a contribution towards 'Students' Welfare Fund'. As a part of the scheme, some rules were laid down to utilize the fund in a proper way.

The utilization of this fund is used for the admissions of poor and needy with the good academic record.

As a part of educational purposes, it is used for supplying learning material including learning aids, waving off admission and examination fees, bus fare, college uniforms, hostel fees, etc.

As a novel idea to assist the students who unfortunately become the victim of accidents, the 'Students' Welfare Fund' also assists them in undergoing medical treatment.

'Students' Welfare Fund' is also utilized for the purpose of helping the poor and needy students who attend the college regularly but reside at distant places. Due to the unavailability of the transport facility, the students are provided with bicycles.

The practice is continued for the last more than a decade.

1.Evidence of Success

Through this practice, the institution has extended a helping hand to the needy students of the institution. There is much evidence of success. A student, Ku. Deepali Sudam Jogi had a serious car accident and advised a brain surgery immediately. The institution immediately sanctioned the amount of Rs.50,000/- was provided for medical treatment including Rs. 50,000/- (cheque No.112151 on dated 15/12/2012) through the nationalized bank (BOI) with the account No. 961320110000013. As a result, the girl recovered her health.

The institution had an adopted village Umarwahi. Every year NSS annual camp was held there. The institution observed the need for preparation of the playground for the children of the school and sanctioned the amount of Rs 15,000. (Cheque No.112160 on dated 10/05/2016). Today, the ground has proved to be a good place for organizing the games and sports competitions.

To fulfill the need of the students residing in distant places, the institution purchased six bicycles so far and they are transferred every year to the students of the next year. The institution runs 'Women's Hostel' for poor and needy girl students. The institution has pointed out the neediest girls among them and extended the help of Rs 13,500 as hostel fees. In the year 2019-20, altogether Rs 26240 (Cheque No.112171 on dated 28/02/2020) were spent towards medical help, exam fees, competitive exam books, room rent, learning aid, typing fees, bus fare, repairing of bicycles, hostel fees, etc.

1.Problems Encountered and Resources Required

There are many students seeking help from the institution. But the institution has sorted the neediest and clever, they were interviewed and after scrutinizing them, the help is provided. As usual, there were many problems in the implementation. Some problems like the mindset of some staff members, the permission of the principal, and Executive Management. But due to the strong will of cooperation, the 'Students' Welfare Fund' committee overcame such difficulties in the way of successful implementation of this scheme.

So far as the resources of this scheme are concerned, the committee reflected on the issue and considered all the possible resources required for the implementation scheme. It was found that the staff members are only resources for the implementation of the scheme. Cooperation from other resources like management certainly cannot be ignored.

Practice: II

1. Title of the Practice: Gender Sensitization

1. Objectives of the Practice

- To aware the students about gender issues and work towards creating an enabling environment of gender justice
- To sensitize the students on gender equality
- To create values that support the girl students and their rights
- To establish good gender balance in the decision-making process in all activities

1. The Context

Being a co-education institution in socially backward and rural areas, it was experienced that there is gender bias in society. In order to sensitize the issue among the students, the institution has been conducting various sensitization campaigns, workshops, programs, activities, etc. The institution established the Sexual Harassment Committee and Women's Studies and Service Centre to make aware the students about gender sensitization. In observing gender equality, the girls are provided various facilities and special attention. It also aims to provide a harmonious and fertile environment for all students to excel physically, mentally, intellectually, and emotionally upholding ethics and values. It is a best practice the institution has been running to change their perspective about gender and create a safe and secure environment for all.

1. The Practice

Recognizing the significant need for awareness of sexual harassment, according to Justice Chandrashekhar

Dharmadhikari and Vishakha Guidelines the institution has constituted the Sexual Harassment Committee. To achieve the target of gender sensitization among the students, the institution has established the following different cells- Women's Studies and Service Centre, Students Grievance and Redressal Cell, Internal Complaint Committee, and Anti Ragging Cell.

Special Study Rooms, Cycle Stand, Girls Common Room, Washroom Facility, Drinking Water Facility, Sanitary Napkin Vending Machine, etc are provided for the girls. The institution has Anti-Ragging and Discipline Committee, and an Anti-sexual Harassment Cell. The girl students are provided special guidance on health and hygiene, gender sensitization, medical check-up, Blood Group, and Hb Detection, etc under Women's Studies and Service Centre. The lectures of eminent personalities are held on various topics. Various gender sensitization programs are organized by different committees in the college to bring out the overall development of the students and thereby to mold a better society with equality.

The institution has kept a complaint box on the premises to register the complaints of the students. The students can lodge their complaints regarding harassment, ragging, teasing, and other requirements. The complaints box is opened by the concerning authority to redress the grievances. The institution has installed CCTV cameras at the prominent spots on the premise to observe wrongdoings if any.

Taking into consideration the importance of sports activities, the institution organizes separate competitions for female students and the winners are felicitated in the annual gathering. The university level/ zonal sports competitions are hosted by the institution every year.

1.Evidence of Success

Gender sensitization in the institution brought a significant change in behavior and understanding the views on gender equality. It helped the students in evaluating theirs before and after personal attitudes and beliefs on the opposite sex.

The organization of gender sensitization programs has created a friendly atmosphere among the students.

CCTV watch at the specific spots has prevented the students' wrongdoings.

The complaint box helps the students to lodge any grievances freely.

Sanitary Napkin Vending Machine installed in the girls' common room has easy access for the girls to use them as and when required.

The institution encourages all the students to participate in university-level cultural activities and sports activities. As a result, many students in the institution have bagged prestigious prizes and are honored by the university with '*Colour Coat*'.

1.Problems Encountered and Resources Required

The traditional mindset of gender discrimination is deeply rooted in the mindset of society, the institution tries to eradicate this mindset through various workshops and guest lectures. Being students from rural areas, there is a lack of exposure to gender equalities. There is economic backwardness among the students

towards modern updating. The backward mindset of the parents is also a hindrance to students' progress. The dominance of illiteracy of the parents and ignorance towards legal provision in society are also barriers. Limited opportunities, lack of industrialization, and urban ecological situation are the main reason for unemployment.

The institution strives hard to cater to the resources by organizing various activities like workshops, seminars, guest lectures, competitive exams based on awareness of legal laws, etc. Although the institution provides platforms to the students for their elevation, these efforts need adequate support from government officials, NGOs, UGC, and other agencies.

7.3 Institutional Distinctiveness

7.3.1 Portray the performance of the Institution in one area distinctive to its priority and thrust within 1000 words

Response:

The vision of the institution, Shri Dnyanesh Mahavidyalaya is '*An institution of international standards, rooted in traditional values with a global perspective.*'. To cultivate competence and efficiency along with character and integrity amongst the **youth in the rural area**, the institution makes die-hard efforts for the creation of a society that is not only progressive but also inclusive since its inception in 1968. The habitat, floral and faunal density and diversity, satisfactory infrastructure, and sufficient residential facilities (Girls Hostel) for needy and poor girl students contribute to the sustenance of the institution in higher education.

The institution caters to the rural population dependent on agriculture, by introducing a certificate course in Vermicomposting. Pursuing UG and PG, the students study these courses side by side, which enhances their practical knowledge in agriculture to tackle the employability issue to some extent. Vermicomposting plays a significant role in rural areas. It is experienced that due to ignorance, people have been using excessive amounts of chemical and synthetic fertilizers, pesticides, and herbicides. To minimize this use to some extent, the institution has been running this project for many years catering to the organic fertilizers to the people in the vicinity.

The aim of the institution is to motivate the students towards higher education and strengthen their capabilities. located at the remote and socio-economically backward region in Maharashtra state, continual uplift and progress of the surroundings indicate the painstaking efforts taken by the institution. **The institution has started PG programs in Arts (Economics, History and Pol Science) and Science subjects (Chemistry, Physics, and Zoology) in the year 2019-20.** It was seen that the students of the

institution were facing numerous problems for pursuing post-graduation in their subject. There was no availability of the PG institution in the vicinity hence they had to join the PG institutions located at far distant places. The institution considered this problem very seriously and decided to start PG courses in order to fulfill the educational thrust of the students. In the year 2018-19, the institution sent the proposal to start **PG programs in Physics, Chemistry, Zoology, Economics, History, and Political Science** to Gondwana University, Gadchiroli, and eventually received a positive response. This was not an easy task for the institution as there was the unavailability of PG labs especially for science subjects, besides there was no financial support from the government-funding agency. However, due to the support and co-operation of the executive management, the institution could able to built well-equipped labs for the science subjects and started all the PG programs from the session 2019-20.

The institution is committed to sculpting future citizens who are fully equipped with graduate attributes and employability. This commitment is made possible by conducting Entry-in-Services Scheme, Remedial Coaching, arranging seminars/ conferences/ workshops, rendering social service through NSS, Guest Lectures, University Level Events, Language Lab, Wi-Fi, etc.

The independent library containing adequate books for competitive exams and 24x7 reading room in the institution for the preparation of competitive examination is quenching the thrust of the aspiring students. The central library is enriched with more than 29,000 books comprised of encyclopedias, rare collection of religious books, e-books, magazines etc. Also, the library has subscribed 10 daily Newspapers in different languages. INFLIBNET and N-LIST are the key features of the library.

The institution has a special cell, Internal Complaint Committee (ICC) to empower the girl students, which provides them safety at their workplace (College). In addition, ICC also provides legal training to the students about many important laws useful in their day-to-day life.

A well-equipped and student-friendly Physical Education Department has a huge sports ground and other facilities, which provide avenues for the participation of the students in sporting activities. A gymnasium in the institution fulfills the demand for the physical fitness of the students.

The NSS unit addresses the innate social responsibility of the students through various activities that are focused on social issues, local needs, and issues of State and National importance. The institution is the recipient of the prestigious State Level Best NSS Unit Award. The unit is devoted to social commitment and has credit to organize a state-level NSS camp successfully in 2018-19 comprised of 225 volunteers from various universities across Maharashtra.

One of the key aspects of the institution is that a significant amount of the teaching staff is involved in the Board of Studies (BoS) of the affiliated university, which designs the curriculum of their respective subjects in the university.

12 teachers out of 18 are Ph.D. holders whereas 4 have registered for Ph.D. Six faculty members are Ph.D. supervisors.

'Master Software' is operational in the institution to perform office automation properly. Computer Centre caters to the need of internet and e-resources. The Language lab is functional and enhancing the communicative skills of the students.

The science labs are rendering service to the UG students. To fulfill the need of PG students, separate labs

are constructed.

All the departments are equipped with internet facility. ICT classrooms provide a platform for the teaching-learning process.

The independent ICT equipped auditorium '*Pasaydan*' with the capacity of 2000 audience is constructed to organize various activities.

The eco-friendly rooftop solar panel unit with the capacity of 2KWA in the institution is proved effective to generate energy to minimize the expenses on power bills. A generator is also installed in case of power failure.

The institution has collaborated with 5 agencies to exchange knowledge through MoU.

The college magazine is published annually by the institution. It added a feather in the cap of the institution by receiving the 'Best Magazine Award' twice in the competition of best magazine organized by the affiliated university. One of the faculty members is the recipient of the CARL LINNAEUS SCIENTIST national award.

The institution also runs a study center Yashwantrao Chavhan Maharashtra Open University (YCMOU) that provides a platform for education to the students who cannot attend the college regularly.

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Concluding Remarks :

Though the institution is situated in the socio-economically backward region of Eastern Vidarbha, it is one of the best and oldest institutions in the area and has its own building equipped with well-furnished classrooms, ICT rooms, and a well-equipped auditorium, Botanical garden, A rooftop solar panel, safe drinking water facility, and Independent Library, 'Pasaydan'. The institution strives hard for the students' health hygiene and their academic excellence. Sanitary Napkin Vending Machine is installed in Girls Common Room for their safety, A complaint box is placed in the campus, CCTV cameras are also installed on the campus.

The institution has 24 programs in Arts and Science faculty (CBCS courses) with 2 certificate courses. 12 faculty members are Ph.D. holders out of 18. the experienced faculty members have more than 130 research papers published in National and International journals.

The institution has MoUs with 5 institutions and societies. It has also completed Academic and Administrative Audit, Green Audit, and Energy Audit successfully.

The feedbacks are collected from all the stakeholders for the institution's introspection. The Alumni Association of the institution is registered. 'The Endowment Funds' for payment of fees, supplying cycles for the students residing at the distant places from the institution, the supply of college dress code to the poor students and concession in the hostel fees to the very needy students in the institution through 'Students Welfare Scheme' run by the institution. The institution has various skill development courses like Vermiculture Mushroom Culture projects, Entry in Services Scheme, Remedial Coaching, etc. These programs along with class seminars, students' projects, students' presentations, and student participation in subject forums and societies of various departments enhance the capabilities of the students besides their regular curriculum-based studies. A 24/7 reading room is available for the competitive exam aspirants.

A well equipped and student-friendly Physical Education Department having a vast sports ground and other facilities provides avenues for the participation of the students in sporting activities. The NSS addresses the innate social responsibility of the students through various activities that are focused on social issues, local needs, and issues of State and National importance.
